2018: lessons learned, memories made

Compatriots of the South Carolina Society,

It's hard to believe it, but 2018 is almost over! The holidays have arrived again and we take stock of another year: lessons learned and memories made.

The Col. Robert Anderson Chapter hosted its annual commemoration of the battle of the Great Cane Break at Hopkins Farm Dec. 1 (see article and photos on page 16). On Dec. 21, 1775, Col. Richard Richardson ordered 1,300 men under Maj. William Thomson to pursue British Loyalists into Indian territory in the Upstate of South Carolina.

Thomson marched 25 miles through the night to a camp where Loyalists had been sheltering from cold rain and snow flurries in a "Brake of Canes." Because the ground was wet and the Loyalists had been burning cane stalks that popped and crackled, Thomson's men nearly managed to surround the camp before being discovered as they attacked at dawn.

The Loyalist commander, Capt. Patrick Cunningham, escaped on an unsaddled horse. The Patriots recaptured munitions intended for the Cherokees, and took 130 prisoners, forcing them to sign a document promising not to take up arms again. Only five or six Loyalists were killed, though Thomson had to restrain his men from harming the prisoners, some of whom were sent off to Charles Town in chains. The weekend of Jan. 18 and 19, the SCSSAR hosts two important events. First is the South Atlantic District meeting, led by our own Vice President



General Dan Woodruff. Second is the SCSSAR's annual commemoration of the American victory at the Battle of Cowpens. This is a national event and was a landmark victory for the Patriots during the Southern Campaign. President General Warren Alter and other general officers will be in attendance. I encourage you all to attend if you haven't in the past—please visit scssar.org for details.

At our last Board of Governors meeting in October, the date was announced for the next annual meeting: March 29 and 30 in Georgetown. Pee Dee Regional Vice President Frank Brown and the local area chapters are doing a fantastic job planning this year's meeting. I encourage you all to attend and enjoy the events and fellowship. Along those lines, please contact Compatriot Ted Morton, chairman of the SCSSAR Nominating Committee, if you or another compatriot you know of would be willing to serve the state society in some capacity-either as a member or chairman of one of our various committees or even as a state officer.


238th anniversary Battle of King's Mountain





The SCSSAR's 2019 Colonial Ball with debutante presentation is expected to be held on the evening of Saturday, Dec. 21, 2019 at the Francis Marion Hotel in Charleston.

The Colonial Ball is a grand affair and past debutantes and attendees rave about a most memorable experience. The pomp and circumstance with Citadel Cadets, a piper, a live band, beautiful debutantes dressed in white with handsome escorts dressed in tails, and a great dinner deliver an extravagant feast for the eyes, ears and palate, not to be missed.



Ninety Six National Historic Site Adds Program to Interpret History

Ninety Six National Historic Site unveiled a new weekend program Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 17-18, adding to its repertoire of Revolutionary War history interpretation.

The new program provided a Battlefield Tour of the Battle of Ninety Six and Ranger Talks on "War Comes to the Backcountry," which detailed the events leading up to the Battle of Ninety Six. Small arms weapons demonstrations were a special feature, as well as activities for children.

Combined effort

National Park Service Rangers, supported by park volunteers, provided guidance, gave lectures and conducted tours. Cambridge Chapter President Richard Morris, a volunteer at Ninety Six, led tours of the fort, outfitted in his Colonial dress.

A small encampment of reenactors provided demonstrations of Colonial life, cooking and crafts.


Recognizing Bell's accomplishment in attaining Eagle rank, Scoutmaster Patton noted that only six out of 100 Scouts make the grade. Scout Bell earned 25 Merit Badges, exceeding the minimum 21 required for Eagle status.

For his Eagle Scout project, Harrison Bell constructed bat boxes, which were installed at three recreation sites in Abbeville where sports events for youths are conducted.

Troop 62 has a membership of 15 Scouts. Harrison Bell became the Troop's 65th member to adorn his uniform with Eagle Scout identification.

Two weeks after Bell joined the elect Eagle Scout group, another member of Troop 62, Jake Alexander, stood before Scoutmaster Patton to receive his promotion. Following the presentation by Patton, Ted R. Morton Jr., Cambridge Chapter Chaplain, presented the SAR "Certificate of Recognition." State Representative John McCravy of Greenwood presented a certificate from the SC House of Representatives recognizing Alexander's achievement.

The Sunday afternoon Court of Honor took place at Greenwood Christian School and Church, Alexander's home church. His Eagle project was the construction of a pavilion on the church grounds for use in sports activities, picnics and other outdoor church programs.




