Daniel Morgan Chapter hosts 238th anniversary Battle of Cowpens

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The 238th anniversary of the Battle of Cowpens commemoration kicked off Thursday evening, Jan. 17, with a presentation sponsored by the SCSSAR, Chautauqua and the Spartanburg County Public Library. Professional actress Judith Kalaora portrayed Deborah Sampson, who at the age of 5 was forced to work on a neighbor's farm

where she learned to work hard and to shoot game for the farmer's table.

After 10 years of this life she wanted to do something for her country during the Revolutionary War, so she disguised herself and dressed as a man, taking the name Robert Shurtlieff, and enlisted in the 4th Massachusetts Regiment of the Continental Army. "Pvt. Shurtlieff" fought in several battles and was wounded twice. As a result she was discovered and discharged from the Continental Army. In later life, various male officers who served with her vouched for her service and bravery and she then received a soldier's pension.

On Friday, Jan. 18, a ceremony was held at the General Daniel Morgan statue on Daniel Morgan Square in Spartanburg. It concluded with the laying of red carnations by the participants.

Later that afternoon, Vice President General Daniel K. Woodruff conducted a meeting of the South Atlantic District at the Courtyard by Marriott. After the meeting, the Daniel Morgan Chapter hosted a reception.

The wreath-laying ceremony took place Saturday, Jan. 19, at the History and Art Museum, because it was raining and the government shutdown closed the Cow-

> pens National Battlefield. LeighAnn Snuggs of the Cherokee County Visitors Center arranged for the alternate location. Compatriot John Slaughter gave an inspiring speech. The massed Color Guard was led by National Color Guard Commander Mark Anthony and was accompanied by two boys with fife and drum.

> After the ceremony the participants were invited to attend It's a Boston Tea Party-Gaffney Style! hosted by the Gaffney Visitors Center, which gave attendees an opportunity to see their Revolutionary War room. The hospitality of LeighAnn Snuggs was most appreciated. Later some participants had lunch at Fatz Restaurant in Gaffney.





Greg and Barbara Ohanesian give historical presentations to students

WALLACE — The kindergarten through fourth graders at Wallace Elementary Middle School were treated to a historical presentation on the Battle of Yorktown by Dr. Greg Ohanesian Oct. 24.

The Battle of Yorktown ended in a decisive victory for the American Patriots Oct. 19, 1781. The combined forces of the American Continental Army led by Gen. George Washington and the French Army led by Gen. Jean-Baptiste Rochambeau defeated a British Army commanded by British Gen. Charles Cornwallis. Washington and Rochambeau decided to join forces with Admiral Comte de Grasse, Commander of the French fleet.

Cols. John Laurens of South Carolina, and Alexander Hamilton of New York, and Gen. Le Marquis de Lafayette led American forces into combat on Oct. 16, 1781, which destroyed British morale and led to significant British casualties and resulted in Gen. Cornwallis' decision to finally surrender. Oct. 19, 1781 has been referred to as the day "The World Turned Upside Down".

Dr. Barbara Ohanesian enchanted the kindergarten through fourth graders at Wallace Elementary Middle School on Oct. 24 with true stories of two heroines of the American Revolution.

Emily Geiger, 16 years old, risked being captured by the British and prosecution as a spy by hand delivering a message, handwritten on paper, of warning to Gen. Francis Marion. She was stopped by the British and searched, but managed to eat the paper message, preventing her capture. She then rode all night to deliver her memorized message, allowing the Patriots to escape. The children were most fascinated by the quick thinking of Emily by eating the message.

A second story involved Mrs. Rebecca Motte, who owned a beautiful home that was overtaken and later occupied by the British. Gen. Francis Marion and his men wanted to capture the British. Mrs. Motte offered to allow them to burn her home to force the British out. She gave the first burning arrow to Gen. Marion. The British fled the home and were

captured. Mrs. Motte then prepared and served an outdoor meal to Gen. Marion, his officers and the captured British officers. Mrs. Ohanesian and the children pretended to release the first arrow. Thanks to the staff at Wallace Elementary Middle School for the opportunity to present to the students and to Mrs. Mandy Shaw for the photos and the arrangements for the event.

We have had one enemy more pernicious to us than all the rest, and that is our own backsliding heart, which has plunged the whole country into so wonderful a degeneracy, that I have sometimes been discouraged from writing the church-history of the country.... Purple Heart Initiative

This program donates a canvas print (24 "x 18") on behalf of all Veterans in the community that has been designated a Purple Heart community by Proclamation and approved. Paving tribute to those that have received the Purple Heart. Each commissioned numbered Canvas print meets the standards for museum quality for display.

Research was conducted by the Indian Land, SC- Sons of the American Revolution Chapter, Major Robert Crawford, South Carolina Society.

Print Designed by John Marker and Dr. Patricia Hinton.

"The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration in present use and was initially created as the Badge of Military Merit by General George Washington on August 7, 1782.

It was made available to the common soldier and is specifically awarded to members of the United States Armed Forces who have been wounded or paid the ultimate sacrifice in Combat with a declared enemy of the United States of America."

The commission canvas print is the original transcribed text from the General order of Gen. George Washington, given on Wednesday, 7 Aug 1782 for the 'Badge of Military Merit' (Purple Heart) and the 'Honorary Badge of Distinction' (service strips / left sleeve). Both Badges (awards) were in the same General Order.

The Purple Heart (Badge of Military Merit)

"By order of the President of the United States, the Purple Heart established by General George Washington at Newburgh, August 7, 1782, during the War of the Revolution, is hereby revived on the 200th Anniversary of George Washington's birth, out of respect to his memory and military achievements. By Order of the Secretary War: Douglas MacArthur, General Chief of Staff. General Order No.3, 22 Feb 1932."



President Paul Walter (2016-2018) opened the meeting with an invocation and pledges. The reports of Secretary, Treasurer and Registrar were then presented.





Cambridge Chapter Hosts Annual Patriot Dinner Program

GREENWOOD — The ballroom of Greenwood's Inn on the Square was filled to capacity Tuesday, Feb. 12, as members of the DAR, C.A.R. and SAR gathered for the Patriot Dinner, hosted each February by Cambridge Chapter.

Cambridge Chapter President Richard Morris presided. President Morris called past SAR State Chaplain Lawrence Peeples to offer the invocation. The opening ritual was led by President Theodore Walker of the Henry Laurens Chapter in Aiken.

Those attending were taken along a timeline of "The Liberty Trail," as Aliene S. Humphries demonstrated the importance of South Carolina in the American Revolution. South Carolina experienced more battles and other military engagements than any of the other American Colonies.

Mrs. Humphries showed her audience how the war began in the Northeast, and ended at Yorktown, but was actually won in South Carolina. From the Battle of Fort Sullivan (later renamed Fort Moultrie) to the Battle of Kings Mountain — with many encounters like Musgrove Mill and Cowpens — the Continental Army, aided by Militia units and many Patriots, bested the forces of King George III. Gen. George Washington led the Patriots to the victory that created the United States of America.

Mrs. Humphries, a member of the Hobkirk Hill Chapter DAR, was introduced by Cambridge Chapter member and longtime friend, Ralph Scurry.

President Morris introduced guests including Mrs. Dianne Culbertson, Vice President General, National Society DAR; David P. Smith Jr., Vice President, Piedmont Region, SC Society SAR; Thomas Forte, President, and Larry Killian, Vice President, Col. Philemon Waters Chapter/SAR (Newberry); Theodore Walker, President, and Robert Johnson, Secretary, Henry Laurens Chapter SAR (Aiken); Charles McKinney of the Gen. SCSSAR and serve with other compatriots who are dedicated to honoring the lives of our forefathers and keeping the principles of our Revolution alive.

While many in our country are actively trying to re-write our history and point fingers for wrongs done centuries ago without context or forgiveness, we need to pass down to our children the gifts of our Revolution; namely, the fact that ours was the first revolution in the history of mankind that truly reversed the course of government, and with three little words: "We the People."

"We the People" tell the government what to do; it doesn't tell us. Almost all the world's constitutions are documents in which governments tell the people what their privileges are. Our Constitution is a document in which "We the People" tell the government what it is allowed to do.

SCSSAR Wins Public Broadcasting Emmy



We won a public Broadcasting Emmy award. 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240th Anniversary of the Battle of Port Royal Island

BEAUFORT — Members and guests of the Gov. Paul Hamilton Chapter gathered Sunday, Feb. 3, at the SC Historical Marker on Highway 21 in Beaufort to honor the Patriots who showed the vaunted British army that Continentals and Militia could hold their own on the field of battle.

Two attendees, Maj. Robert de Treville (U.S. Army Ret.) of the Gov. Paul Hamilton Chapter and Anita Henson paid great respect to ancestors who fought in the battle. Mrs. Henson, representing the Thomas Heyward Jr. DAR Chapter, prepared a wreath of magnolia leaves and camellias for the dedication.

The Battle

On the morning of Feb. 2, 1779, Gens. William Moultrie and Steven Bull left a small detachment of guards at their mainland camp and moved their army and field pieces by a ferry over to the Port Royal Island, taking the better part of the day to complete this transfer.

After sunset Gen. Moultrie marched the army toward the outskirts of Beaufort, rested his men for a few hours and marched into town at sunrise on Feb. 3.

While this was going on, British forces under Major William Gardiner had returned to their ships after burning and plundering neighboring plantations along the Broad River and adjacent areas. However, at daybreak on Feb. 3, three British companies of riflemen and some artillery comprising about 200 men were again landed on Port Royal Island and they proceeded toward Port Royal Ferry.

On that morning Gen. Moultrie's and Gen. Bull's forces in Beaufort were about 10 miles from Maj. Gardiner's forces near Port Royal Ferry. When Gen. Moultrie was advised by scouts that the British had landed once again (probably near Laurel Bay and Clarendon Plantations) and were closing in at five to six miles from Beaufort, he hastened to meet the enemy and join battle before they reached Beaufort.

Capt. John de Treville and his 20 Continentals of the 4th Regiment of Artillery came out from Beaufort's Fort Lyttleton, fought near the Halfway House, which was located between what is known as Grays Hill and the Marine Corps Air Station. Moultrie drew up his troops about 200 yards from the enemy, placing them on the right and left sides of the causeway with his two field pieces (six pounders) in between with his small piece (two pounder) on the right in the woods.

A reversal of normal fighting positions prevailed as the British were under cover in a swampy area, while the Americans in the open. Moultrie gave the order to fire, which Capt. Thomas Heyward Jr. and Lt. Benjamin Wilkins did promptly with both field pieces, killing two British officers and Maj. Gardiner's horse. The

enemy's only field piece was struck and dismounted early in the battle.

The firing carried on for 30 to 45 minutes, when Capt. Heyward advised Moultrie that Lt. Wilkins had been gravely wounded and their ammunition was nearly expended.

Moultrie then ordered the Americans to retire slowly. Little did Moultrie know that the British, after suffering losses, had already started their retreat before Heyward notified Moultrie of his limited artillery munitions. This lack of ammunition kept Moultrie from pursuing the British, who were retreating to their ships and for safe passage back to Savannah.

Due to having left the field last, the battle went to the Americans. As the enemy retreated, Capt. John Barnwell of the Beaufort militia and a few men rode around the enemy formation capturing 26 stragglers and nearly panicking Maj. Gardiner's command as they moved toward their waiting ships.

More than 40 British were killed and wounded, while the Patriots suffered eight killed and 22 wounded. After the battle Gen. Moultrie said that the Americans, untrained militia, had stood well during battle. In addition to Capt. Thomas Heyward Jr., fellow SC Declaration of Independence signer Capt. Edward Rutledge also participated in the battle.
