From the President's Desk

SCSSAR: What is our purpose?

SAR is a fairly exclusive organization, many who try to join are turned away; missing the genealogical documentation required to establish the bone fides of their heritage.

Our proven, direct relationship to Pa-

triot ancestors who either fought in, or provided material support to the Revolutionary War makes us members of a fairly exclusive group.

Qualifying for membership can be difficult. Today, SAR has over 33,000 members,



and since our founding in 1890, has accepted more than 200,000 men. SAR remains the largest male lineage organization in the United States.

Our South Carolina Society currently has 844 members. Our largest Chapter is Maj. Gen. William Moultrie in Charleston, with 125 members, and our smallest is Thomas Lynch near Columbia with 12.

I've heard folks say that we are a society of older men. The oldest person on our state roster is 101 and the youngest is 12. Seventy-one percent of our members are age 60 or older, while 21 percent are older than 80. The Matthew Singleton Chapter near Sumter has the most senior group of members with 40 percent being age 80 or older. The Col. William Bratton Chapter near Rock Hill is the youngest, with men aged 80 or greater comprising only 8 percent of their membership.

But what is the purpose of our organization, what do we actually do? There are three objects to our Society: (1) patriotic, (2) historical and (3) educational. One of our primary purposes is to perpetuate the memory of the men and women who, through the American Revolution, achieved the independence of the American people.

We do this through the solemn ceremony of marking the graves of Revolutionary patriots, and by commemorating the battles and skirmishes that led to our freedom. We march in patriotic parades, gather together at patriotic events, and spend our time and money to honor those who served.

We do this out of our own profound respect for our revolutionary lineage, but also to inspire the greater community and to encourage their respect for the principles of government founded by our forefathers. We try to set a good example for our fellow citizens.

Presenting certificates to our neighbors and local businesses who proudly and properly fly the American flag encourages them to continue flying our flag, and to always do it correctly. Having this recognition published in a local paper gives your Chapter good visibility, and will make some readers think, "I'll start flying my flag too." I think more American flags flying in our neighborhoods is a good thing.

Our Chapters actively engage with teachers, students, ROTC and JROTC to promote and reward those who excel in patriotic projects. We search for and encourage American history teachers whose curriculum teaches students about the American Revolution era to apply for the Dr. Tom and Betty Lawrence American History Teacher Awards.

We reach out to schools to find students in grades 9 through 12 who would like to write patriotic essays about the American Revolution and enter the George S. and Stella M. Knight Essay Contest. Students at the same grade level can enter the Joseph S. Rumbaugh Historical Oration Contest, where they give an original oration from memory pertaining to the Revolutionary

Samuel Doak's Sermon and Prayer before Battle of Kings Mountain

"My countrymen, you are about to set out on an expedition which is full of hardships and dangers, but one in which the Almighty will attend you. The Mother Country has her hands upon you, these American Colonies, and takes that for which our fathers planted their homes in the wilderness — OUR LIBERTY.

"Taxation without representation and the quartering of soldiers in the homes of our people without their consent are evidence that the Crown of England would take from its American Subjects the last vestige of Freedom.

"Your brethren across the mountains are crying like Macedonia unto your help. God forbid that you shall refuse to hear and answer their call — but the call of your brethren is not all. The enemy is marching hither to destroy your own homes.

"Brave men, you are not unacquainted with battle. Your hands have already been taught to war and your fingers to fight. You have wrested these beautiful valleys of the Holston, and Watauga from the savage hand. Will you tarry now until the other enemy carries fire and sword to your very doors? No, it shall not be. Go forth then in the strength of your manhood to the aid of your brethren, the defense of your liberty and the protection of your homes. And may the God of Justice be with you and give you victory. Let Us Pray" "Almighty and gracious God! Thou hast been the refuge and strength of Thy people in all ages. In time of sorest need we have learned to come to Thee — our Rock and our Fortress. Thou knowest the dangers and snares that surround us on march and in battle.

"Thou knowest the dangers that constantly threaten the humble, but well beloved homes which Thy servants have left behind them. O, in Thine infinite mercy, save us from the cruel hand of the savage, and of Tyrant. Save the unprotected homes while fathers and husbands and sons are far away fighting for freedom and helping the oppressed. Thou, who promised to protect the Sparrow in its flight, keep ceaseless watch, by day and by night, over our loved ones. The helpless woman and little children, we commit to Thy care. Thou wilt not leave them or forsake them in times of loneliness and anxiety and terror. O, God of Battle, arise in Thy might. Avenge the slaughter of Thy people. Confound those who plot for our destruction. Crown this mighty effort with victory, and smite those who exalt themselves against liberty and justice and truth. Help us as good soldiers to wield the SWORD OF THE LORD AND GIDEON. Amen

Rev. Doak was the first president of Washington College, near Greeneville, Tennessee. His son Dr. John Whitfileld Doak succeeded him in later years as the president of Washington College.

War. We recognize winners at the Chapter, State and National level, where a \$6,000 grand prize is awarded.

Students in grades 6 through 8 are encouraged to create a tri-fold brochure based on one of our country's five foundational documents and enter the Sgt. Moses Adams Memorial Middle School Brochure Contest. Children in grades 3 through 5 who are studying the American Revolution are able to submit a poster on Revolutionary War events to win The Americanism Poster Contest at the Chapter, State and National levels. The outstanding ROTC and JROTC cadets are awarded the silver or bronze medals by the sponsoring Chapter. The State winner competes nationally with a grand prize of \$5,000.

Our relationship with Scouting, and in particular with the Eagle Scout program, has always been important. Chapters present all Eagle Scouts in their area with the National Society's Eagle Scout Certificate of Recognition. Eagle Scouts are then encouraged to enter the Arthur M. and Berdena King Eagle Scout Contest. The Eagle Scout winning SC SAR competition competes nationally for a \$10,000 grand prize.

Another purpose of our Society is to unite and promote fellowship among the descendants of our Patriot ancestors, our Compatriots. Compatriots enjoy the fellowship of one another at Chapter meetings, SAR social gatherings, and commemoraelect one candidate over the other.

The Daniel Morgan Chapter, with Chapter President Grantham Wood taking the lead, handled all lodging, dining and venue needs of the group. Compatriot Dave Desmarais, chairman of our Technology Committee and from the Gen. Andrew Pickens Chapter, handled all video, Zoom and technology aspects of the meeting. The meeting concluded with a barbecue buffet arranged by Compatriot Wood.

Program to Mark Graves of SC Society Founders Progresses With Assistance From SAR Chapters

A State Society project to mark the graves of the men who founded the South Carolina Society SAR was launched with ceremonies to mark the burial sites of two Founders. The project was proposed by former SCSSAR State Historian Guy Higgins, and when presented to the Board of Governors was approved.

The first Founder Grave Marking Ceremony was conducted at the Quaker Cemetery in Camden for Founder John Peter Richardson III.

Governor Richardson, 83rd Governor of South Carolina (1886-1890), initiated the effort to organize the Sons of the American Revolution in South Carolina. Gov. Richardson died in Columbia July 6, 1899, while in office.

The National Society had chartered the South Carolina Society 10 years earlier on April 18, 1889.

Sponsoring the Camden Grave Marking Nov. 2, 2019 were the Joseph Kershaw, Matthew Singleton, Thomas Taylor and Godfrey Dreher Chapters.

The second ceremony was conducted Sept. 11, 2021 by the Cambridge Chapter, when the grave of Founder Tillman Watson was marked in the Boatwright-Watson Family Cemetery at Ridge Spring. SCSSAR has no Chapter in Saluda Coun-

According to research on the organization of SAR in South Carolina, Gov. Richardson enlisted help of 24 men. Names (Surname and Given), dates (Birth and Death), position on the organizing committee and burial place were found for all but one member. The surname of this unknown member is believed to have been "Pope," but nothing else is known about him.

Of 25 Founders, 21 are buried in South Carolina. The location of the grave of each is known. Of the four Founders remaining, one is buried in Texas, another in New Hampshire and a third in Massachusetts. The burial site of Founder Pope is unknown.

Former State Historian Higgins arranged for granite markers for each Founder. State Registrar Bill Wilson is custodian of markers for 19 graves yet to be marked.

241st Anniversary Battle of Blackstock's Plantation

Compatriots, Park Service Rangers, and citizens of the Union County area gathered at Blackstock's Plantation Nov. 20 to commemorate the Patriot victory's 241st anniversary.

The event was hosted by the Gen. James Williams Chapter along with C.A.R.'s Col. James Williams Society, and the Battle of Musgrove Mill State Historic Site. Blackstock's battlefield is a state park under the Battle of Musgrove Mill State Historic Site. After the ceremony, 35 people participated in a guided walking tour of the hilly battlefield, while another 12 stayed behind to hear Ranger Mark Stanford's "seated tour" of the battlefield. Attendees enjoyed refreshments provided by the Col. James Williams C.A.R. Society.

At 1 p.m. on Nov. 20, 1780 around 270 of British Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton's divided forces were allowed to catch up with the nearly 1,000 Patriots under Gen. Thomas Sumter at the farm of William Blackstock. Thomas Sumter, known as "the fighting gamecock," was a 46-year-old originally from Virginia. His men were on high ground behind unchinked log buildings and wooden fencing with their backs to the Tyger River.

Tarleton, a 26-year-old from Liverpool, England, attacked and fought his way uphill across open ground. Known as "Bloody Ban" by the Patriots because of his vicious fighting, Tarleton's actions at Bufford's Massacre created the Patriot rallying cry of "Tarleton's Quarter" heard the previous month at the Battle of Kings Mountain. Tarleton and his men were undefeated in battle, his confidence was high and his ego large as he attacked Sumter's fortified positions.

Outnumbered and outguined, Tarleton suffered 92 killed and 100 wounded under the accurate fire of the Patriots. Sumter reported three killed and four wounded.

Sumter himself suffered a major gunshot wound and was out of action until the following year. As the sun set, the battle came to a close and, upon his return the next morning, Tarleton discovered Sumter's men had disbursed under cover of darkness. Tarleton reported to Gen. Charles Cornwallis that he had emerged victorious at Blackstock. General Sumter made a similar report to his superiors.

In every trying hour of the Revolution, women would hold conferences for prayer, that God would be with the armies and give them the victory.

During the battle at Guilford Court House, North Carolina, March 15, 1781, two companies of Christian women were gathered from Dr. Caldwell's congregation, for prayer.

Whilst the two armies met, the British under Cornwallis and the Americans under General Greene, these pious women were in prayer to Almighty God for his protection and aid. In many places the solitary voice of a pious woman went up to the Divine ear, with the earnest pleadings of faith, for the success of the Americans. The battling hosts were surrounded by a cordon of praying women during those dreadful hours of contest.

Mr. Caldwell, in reply to the taunts of a British officer, said, "Wait and see what the Lord will do for us." The results of the battle were "highly beneficial to the cause of the patriots."

Female Spies in the Revolution

During the winter of 1777, when the British had possession of Philadelphia, and Washington was passing a gloomy winter at Valley Forge, with his soul still resting, with hope in God, the ladies of Philadelphia formed an association for the purpose of conveying important information to Washington respecting the plans of the British. Many of the British officers were quartered with patriotic families in the city, and, in a free and familiar way, would unfold to each other their future campaigns to capture our armies and subdue the colonists.

The ladies listened with eager attention and silence to their statements, and then would delegate one of their number to convey the intelligence to a certain point, where another patriotic woman would carry it to another point, and thus these female couriers went from point to point, until the information reached Washington at his head-quarters. These journeys were all performed on foot, and made under pretence of visits of friendship and affection.

Constitution Week in Augusta

The valuable information thus conveyed puzzled the British officers to know how it was communicated, and baffled some of their best-concerted plans. Among the heroic women of that noble band of patriots was a Mrs. Redman, who for many years, with the enthusiasm of woman's heart in a good cause, was accustomed to narrate these incidents of the female patriotism of Revolutionary times.

The above incident was narrated to the compiler of this volume, in April, 1863, by Mrs. Lydia R. Bailey, a venerable Christian lady of Philadelphia, now eighty-five years of age, who often heard it from the lips of Mrs. Redman and other female friends. She also remarked, with tearful emotion, that the present generation did not seem to realize the sacrifices which the blessings of liberty and good government cost, and that in the pride of their hearts they had forgotten the God of their fathers, and acted as if all their prosperity had come, not from the goodness of God, but from their own hands and efforts.

How full of faith and piety were the Christian women of the Revolution, and those who caught the flame of patriotism and piety from such noble Christian ancestors!



240th Anniversary Commemoration of the Second Siege of Augusta

AUGUSTA, Georgia — Many SAR, NSDAR, C.A.R. and other organizations from South Carolina and Georgia participated in the 240th Anniversary Commemoration of the Second Siege of Augusta at the Kroc Center in Augusta Sept. 18.

Compatriot Sonny Pittman was master of ceremonies.

Augusta has a deep, violent Revolutionary War history. One most often noticed by visitors in the downtown area are the many historical markers referencing the two sieges of Augusta in 1780 and 1781.

Those of us in the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution Chapters in Augusta and the River Region are indebted to *Augusta Chronicle* writer Bill Kirby for his frequent articles on Augusta's rich historical legacy.

The freedoms we enjoy in our Constitutional Republic have been dearly bought and paid for by our nation's veterans.

To that end, two of our local SAR chapters, Augusta's Col. William Few and Aiken's Henry Laurens Chapter, hosted a Commemoration of the 240th Anniversary of the Second Siege of Augusta. That epic battle, fought from May 22 to June 5, 1781, resulted in a Patriot victory with the surrender of the Redcoat and Loyalist stronghold known as Fort Cornwallis (near the site of today's St. Paul's Church on Reynolds Street).

Morning activities included opening ceremonies, an SAR Grave Marker dedication for Captain William Bugg Sr., who is buried in his family's cemetery in what is now Pendleton King Park, and the presentation of wreaths by patriotic, fraternal and veterans' organizations.

After lunch, a battle seminar was conducted by historian Steven J. Rauch. Then, attendees went out to the battlefield behind the Kroc Center to render honors and con-





duct a re-enactment of the battle.

Republics demanded virtue. Monarchies could rely on coercion and "dazzling splendor" to suppress self-interest or factions; republics relied on the goodness of the people to put aside private interest for public good. President Elect George Washington Welcomed to Trenton

George Washington en route to New York City to be inaugurated as the nation's first president.

The following historical scene is thus described by Chief Justice Marshall:

"At Trenton, Washington was welcomed in a manner as new as it was pleasing. In addition to the usual demonstrations of respect and attachment which were given by the discharge of cannon, by military corps, and by private persons of distinction, the gentler sex prepared, in their own taste, a tribute of applause indicative of the grateful recollection in which they held their deliverance, twelve years before, from a formidable enemy. On the bridge over the creek which passes through the town was erected a triumphal arch, highly ornamented with laurels and flowers, and supported by thirteen pillars, each entwined with wreaths of evergreen. On the front arch was inscribed, in large gilt letters,

The Defenders of the Mothers will be the

Protectors of the Daughters.

"On the centre of the arch, above the inscription, was a dome or cupola of flowers and evergreens, encircling the dates of the two memorable events which were peculiarly interesting to the people of New Jersey. The first was the battle of Trenton, and the second the bold and judicious stand

taken by the American troops at the same creek, by which the march of the British army was arrested on the evening preceding the battle of Princeton. At this place Washington was met by a party of matrons leading their daughters dressed in white, who carried baskets of flowers in their hands, and sang, with exquisite sweetness, an ode composed for the occasion. It is as follows :

Welcome, mighty chief, once more Welcome to this grateful shore! Now no mercenary foe Aims again the fatal blow, Aims at thee the fatal blow. Virgins fair and matrons grave, Those thy conquering arm did save, Build for thee triumphal bowers; Strew, ye fair, his way with flowers, Strew your hero's way with flowers!

During the American Revolution: At Mecklenburg and Rowan, North Carolina, the young ladies entered into a written pledge not to receive the attentions of young men who would not volunteer in defence of their country. They declared they "were of opinion that such persons who stay loitering at home when the important calls of their country demand their military service abroad, must certainly be destitute of that nobleness of sentiment, that brave and manly spirit, which would qualify them to be the defenders and guardians of the fair sex."

Tombstones and markers were installed at the graves and more than 100 guests were present. SAR, DAR and SR chapters presented wreaths The SC Independent Rangers and the 5th Co. 4th SC Regt., Art. were present for a musket salute and cannon volley.

Martha Washington on the Battlefield

Martha, the wife of Washington, was a woman of fine accomplishments, eminently qualified for the exalted station she was called, in the providence of God, to fill. Her piety and patriotism were equal to every trial, and were constantly exerted in behalf of her country.

She often left the comforts and elegancies of Mount Vernon and spent months with Washington and his armies, cheering them by her presence and encouraging the soldiers by her words.

Mrs. Washington accompanied the general to the line before Boston, and witnessed its siege and evacuation. At the close of each campaign, an aide-de-camp repaired to Mount Vernon to escort her to the head-quarters. Her arrival at the camp was an event much anticipated, and was always the signal for the ladies of general officers to repair to the bosoms of their lords.

The arrival of Mrs. Washington at Valley Forge, Morristown, and West Point diffused a cheering influence amid the gloom that hung over those scenes. She always remained at head-quarters till the opening of the campaign, and often remarked, in after-life, that it had been her good fortune to hear the first cannon at the opening and the last at the closing of every campaign of the Revolutionary War.

During the whole of the period when we struggled for independence, Mrs. Washington preserved her equanimity, together with a degree of cheerfulness that inspired all around her with the brightest hopes of ultimate success.

Actions Approved by the Board of Governors

By David Smith SCSSAR President

The Board of Governors has authority over the State Society and is empowered to take any action it deems necessary to further the SCSSAR's mission. Two things the Board of Governors (BOG) cannot do are (1) amend the State Bylaws and (2) elect State Officers. Those two things can only be done by vote of the full membership at an Annual Meeting

The approved minutes of the BOG meetings and the draft minutes of the most recent meeting are available on the SCSSAR website. Minutes from a BOG meeting are corrected and approved at the subsequent quarterly meeting.

Members of the Board of Governors are:

State Officers, National Trustee, Alternate National Trustee, past State Presidents, Chapter Presidents, one additional delegate from each Chapter selected by the Chapter, and State Committee Chairmen appointed by the President.

All SCSSAR members are encouraged to attend the quarterly board meetings but only board members are allowed to vote. Here are the adopted actions from the July BOG approved minutes.

1. The State will pay \$35 monthly for the shared, temporary rental of a storage unit for storage of State Society archives and property.

2. The presented resolution regarding restitution, restoration, and maintenance of historical monuments will be forwarded to the NSSAR with a request that the resolution be adopted by the National Society. (Note: the text of this resolution is published in this edition of *The Palmetto Patriot*.)

3. The previously adopted motion (from 2017) requiring Color Guard members to have insurance is committed to the Executive Committee for review and report back to the BOG at the October meeting.

4. The previously adopted motion to fund personalized license plates (from 2018) as a fund raising activity is rescinded.

5. The previously adopted motion to create a dues relief fund (from 2018) is rescinded.

6. Action necessary to establish pro-

gram management responsibility of the Swamp Fox Brigade program is postponed to the October BOG meeting.



How to submit items to The Palmetto Patriot

Limit the number of photographs to those you would like most to appear in the publication.

In group shots, have participants drop their hands to their sides to avoid fig leaf poses.

When taking photos at meetings, get as close to the speaker as possible, and avoid shooting the backs of audience heads.

From Eric Barnhill, Gen. Andrew Pickens Chapter: Fill the frame with the subject, unless you are trying to capture a large area (monument, battlefield). Better to get head shots than feet shots. Choose your background carefully. Often it just takes a minute to look around and find a more appropriate background. Watch your lighting. Better to have subjects face the lights (sun for outdoor shots) and be careful of indoor lights, your camera may set the exposure for lights if they are in the shots. Articles are always more interesting when pictures accompany them. Take lots of digital pictures and choose the ones that best capture the subject. Check your spelling, spell check sometimes makes words you don't want.

The following pastoral letter from the Synod of New York and Philadelphia to the congregations under their care, read in every pulpit on the 20th of July, 1776, being the day appointed by the Honorable Congress for a general fast, presents the patriotism of the American Presbyterian Church in a noble attitude:

Very Dear Brethren:—The Synod of New York and Philadelphia, being met at a time when publick affairs wear a threatening aspect, and when (unless God in his sovereign providence speedily prevent it) all the horrours of a civil war throughout this great continent are to be apprehended, were of opinion that they could not discharge their duty to the numerous congregations under their care without addressing them at this important crisis.

As the firm belief and habitual recollection of the power and presence of the living God ought at all times to possess the minds of real Christians, so in seasons of public calamity, when the Lord is known by the judgements which he executeth, it would be an ignorance or an indifference highly criminal, not to look up to him with reverence, to implore his mercy by humble and fervent prayer, and, if possible, to prevent his vengeance by unfeigned repentance.

Col. Robert Anderson Chapter: 246th Anniversary Battle of Great Cane Brake

HOPKINS FARM -The Col. Robert Anderson Chapter commemorated the 246th anniversary of the Battle of the Great Cane Brake, Saturday, Dec. 4, at the site of the battle at Hopkins Farm in Simpsonville. This was the only Revolutionary War battle fought in Greenville County. However, in that month, December 1775, this land was Cherokee territory.

More than 135 people, including 61 middle school students, were in attendance.

Chapter Historian Glenn Farrow recounted the battle: In November 1775 Patrick Cunningham captured a wagon train of shot and powder the Patriots meant to give the Cherokees. Col. Richard Richardson, upon hearing this, dispatched a force of 1,300 men under Col. "Danger" Thomson to capture the stores and route the Loyalists.

After a 23 mile march, Col. Thomson's men found Cunningham and his 200 Loyal-

ists camped in a cane brake, and surrounded them on three sides before they were found out. Cunningham barely escaped, in his britches on horseback. Only one Patriot was wounded. Seventy Loyalists escaped, five or six were killed, and the rest were taken prisoners. Col. Thomson was credited with controlling the attack, else many more would have been killed by his enraged men.

Durant Ashmore, lecturer and historian, gave his Keynote Address about the Loyalists who fought at Cane Brake. He noted that as the Patriots began their march home it began to snow, with an accumulation of two feet. This was known as the beginning of the Snow Campaign. The Loyalists were not to be a serious problem in the upstate again until the British captured Charleston in 1780.

Those in attendance were treated to an opening and closing mortar shot by the 4th SC Regiment, Artillery, and musket volleys by the SC Independent Rangers. At ceremony's end Bugler Bob Cotter played Taps.
